2025 GFWC INTERNATIONAL DAY OF SERVICE TO SPOTLIGHT DOMESTIC AND SEXUAL VIOLENCE — Saturday, September 27

The 2025 General Federation of Women's Clubs (GFWC) International Day of Service (IDS), formerly GFWC National Day of Service (NDS), will focus on *domestic and sexual violence*.

According to the World Health Organization, it is estimated that between 736 million to 852 million women, aged 15 years or older, have experienced domestic and sexual violence. Within the United States, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, more than 16 million people are affected every year.

As GFWC collaborates with various national networks, we look forward to expanding our knowledge of the issues while engaging members and communities to unite in addressing this pervasive societal epidemic. Community service projects for the 2025 GFWC IDS can focus on any area of domestic and sexual violence. Here are eight areas your club might consider:

- Campus Sexual Assault
- Child Abuse
- Elder Abuse
- Human Trafficking for Sexual Purposes
- Intimate Partner Violence
- Military Sexual Assault
- Teen Dating Violence
- Violence Against Native American Women




GFWC New Mexico raised \$2,635 during their Walk to End Alzheimer's

Compassion in Action

The GFWC Alabama President's Project focuses on Mental Health Awareness, and our theme is Compassion in Action. As a society, we have struggled with acknowledging the issues, providing care, and treating those who suffer with dignity and compassion.

Mental health issues are on a broad spectrum ranging from seasonal depression to schizophrenia. Mental health issues are more prevalent than we realize.

Did You Know:

- One in five adults experience mental illness;
- One in six youths aged 6-17 will experience a mental health disorder;
- Suicide is the second leading cause of death among people aged 10-14;
- More than 21% of the unhoused population have a mental health condition;
- Almost 20% of veterans experience a mental illness;
- Two in five people who are incarcerated have a history of mental illness.

GFWC Alabama encourages club members to educate their communities about mental health issues, strive to end the stigma, and be advocates. Our website contains information regarding the president's project, and mental health posts can be found on our social media every Monday. Legislative alerts regarding proposed legislation will be provided, and everyone is asked to support local mental health centers. GFWC Alabama will be co-sponsoring a Mental Health Symposium with the Alabama Department of Mental Health on July 11, 2025, in our state capital.

Every forty seconds someone loses their life to suicide. The 988 Lifeline has become a crucial part of the nation's mental health infrastructure, and Alabama club members have been busy promoting this resource.

GFWC Alabama looks forward to seeing the impact we will have in our state.

Legislative Corner

To encourage participation in the democratic process, this monthly column aims to inform members about current legislation and programs that are germane to the GFWC Resolutions. It also highlights important actions of Congress and the White House, and provides follow-up information about GFWC Legislative Action Alerts.

Congress returned to Washington the week of November 11, after a six-week election break. This lame-duck session will blend lingering issues with the anticipation of the incoming 119th Congress (2025-2026). Any legislation which fails to pass before the end of the year must be reintroduced. In the 2024 elections, Republicans won control of the House of Representatives, the Senate, and the White House so new leadership has been chosen and they will heavily influence which legislation gets finalized by December 2024, and which issues will be dealt with in the new 119th Congress.

<u>GFWC Legislative Action Center</u>: There's still time to utilize the <u>GFWC</u> <u>Legislative Action Center</u>! If you have not contacted your member of Congress or you want to send another message, please act NOW! If you are not yet a member, join now and advocate!

<u>Caregivers:</u> November is National Family Caregivers Month, so let's work with our affiliate, the Alzheimer's Association, to seek final passage of the BOLD Infrastructure Act (H.R. 7218) to strengthen the public health response to dementia. This bill passed the House of Representatives on September 17 and is pending in the Senate.

GFWC also supports our veterans and their families by advocating for the Elizabeth Dole Home Care Act. On Monday, November 18, the House of Representatives passed H.R. 8371, the Elizabeth Dole 21st Century Veterans Healthcare and Benefits Improvement Act, with overwhelming bipartisan support. This comprehensive bill includes the Home Care Act supported by GFWC through the Legislative Action Center.

Breast Cancer: GFWC supports the Find It Early Act.

<u>Victims of Crime Act (VOCA)</u>: GFWC supports legislation to alter the formula for the Crime Victims Fund, providing more funds for domestic violence shelters and rape crisis centers.

<u>Kids Online Safety:</u> GFWC supports the Kids Online Safety Act approved by the Senate and under consideration in the House of Representatives. GFWC International President Suellen Brazil thanked Congresswoman Cathy McMorris Rodgers (WA) for her leadership as chairman of the House Energy and Commerce Committee and for getting the bill reported out of committee and ready for action by the full House of Representatives (<u>Read Letter</u>). GFWC of Washington is also showing their appreciation to Rep. McMorris Rodgers who is retiring in December.

<u>Human Trafficking:</u> GFWC <u>cosigned a letter</u> supporting the Trafficking Victims Protection Act. This bill passed the House of Representatives and is pending in the Senate.

<u>Women's Suffrage National Monument:</u> GFWC supports the passage of H.R. 1318 to locate the monument on the National Mall. The bill has passed the House of Representatives and is pending in the Senate.

<u>FY 2025 Federal Appropriations:</u> GFWC has advocated for funding for programs and services for survivors of domestic and sexual violence, and international vaccine programs. The current Continuing Resolution expires on December 20, and it is still unclear if Congress will complete the FY 2025 appropriations bills or pass another Continuing Resolution into the new year.
